Ocular allergies include acute allergic conjunctivitis, seasonal hay fever conjunctivitis, perennial allergic conjunctivitis, vernal conjunctivitis, and atopic conjunctivitis Friedlaender (1993). Giant papillary conjunctivitis (GPC), often seen in association with the use of contact lens, is also considered an ocular allergy.

Ocular allergy includes several clinically different conditions that can be considered as hypersensitivity disorders of the ocular surface. The classification of these conditions is complex, and their epidemiology has not been adequately studied because of the lack of unequivocal nomenclature. Ocular allergy symptoms are often, but not always, associated with other allergic manifestations, mostly rhinitis.

Each type of ocular allergy is associated with ocular redness, itching, and tearing; however, AKC and VKC can threaten the cornea, and research has revealed that involvement of different immune cell populations (mast cells, eosinophils, and lymphocytes) may cause these more severe symptoms.

Allergic conjunctivitis, also called "allergic rhinoconjunctivitis," is the most common allergic eye disorder. The condition is usually seasonal and is associated with hay fever . The main cause is pollens, although indoor allergens such as dust mites, molds, and dander from household pets such as cats and dogs may affect the eyes year-round.

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Atopic keratoconjunctivitis is the ocular manifestation of a complex and systemic altered immune response, often associated with atopic dermatitis and with other allergic disorders such as rhinitis and asthma.

In older adults, persistent watery eyes may occur as the aging skin of the eyelids sags away from the eyeball, allowing tears to accumulate and flow out. The external eye is under constant immunological challenge from a wide variety of substances; this may lead to the development of one of many conditions that can be loosely grouped as 'allergic eye disease'.

The differential diagnosis of ocular allergic disorders ("red" eye) includes infectious causes (eg, chlamydial disease, molluscum contagiosum, Parinaud's oculoglandular syndrome), chronic forms of conjunctivitis (eg, GPC, VKC, AKC, superior limbic conjunctivitis, follicular conjunctivitis), and miscellaneous disorders (eg, keratoconjunctivitis sicca, acne rosacea, ocular pemphigoid, and blepharoconjunctivitis).

These disorders include conjunctivitis, extrinsic atopic dermatitis (the most common type of eczema), immune-mediated urticaria, immune-mediated angioedema, acute latex allergy, some allergic lung disorders (eg, allergic asthma, IgE-mediated components of allergic bronchopulmonary aspergillosis), allergic rhinitis, and allergic reactions to venomous stings.
